PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Maritime Disasters in South Florida – a Salvors' Paradise

One of the few early economic opportunities in our area, dating back to the sixteenth century, involved maritime salvage. The area's zenith extended from St. Augustine down through the Dry Tortugas.

Spanish ships made numerous journeys from Caribbean and Spanish Main ports, Portobelo, Cartagena, Veracruz, Margarita, Havana, all bound for Spain carrying cargos of precious metals, spices, and gems. They transited the Straits of Florida right off our shores, shoals and coral reefs. Many of these ships went aground or sank due to poor navigation or storm activity well within sight of our coasts. Even those ships convoyed by the Spanish navy in order to protect their valuable cargos from British and French marauders disappeared. Hundreds of wrecks dotted our coastlines, some charted, some not. South Florida became a treasure trove for salvage operations, both legal and off the books, and this activity antedated by centuries the citrus and real estate developers like Henry Flagler, George Merrick, Carl Fisher and even Al Capone. The most recent Spanish ship discovery occurred in 1985 when Nuestra Senora De Atocha was located in waters off the Tortugas with much of her cargo intact.

Fast forward to today.

Shipping disasters are even more prevalent today with fires, collisions, and certainly oil spills with much more at stake. We'll be fortunate to learn more about today's maritime dangers as Joe Farrell, CEO, of our Community Affiliate, Resolve Marine Group, one of the largest salvage, tug and fire fighting operations in the hemisphere, addresses our Council at our monthly dinner on Thursday, February, 10th at Tropical Acres. FEBRUARY'S GUEST SPEAKER



Joseph Farrell Jr.
President/CEO
Resolve Marine Group

In 1980, Joseph Farrell Jr. founded what was to become one of the most effective salvage companies in the Americas. Focusing the initial efforts on the upper Caribbean Islands, Resolve successfully tackled scores of challenging salvage and wreck removal operations. By 1990, an unblemished success record in the Caribbean forged a path of rapid growth. As environmental concerns shaped the salvage industry throughout the world, Resolve expanded its client base by providing emergency responsive services to oil and chemical tankers regulated under the Oil Pollution Act of 1990 (OPA90). With the advent of OPA90, individual states, such as California, implemented their own regulations and Resolve was there to meet those standards. In 1994, Resolve Fire & Hazard Response Inc. was created to operate a state-of-the-art shipboard firefighting training facility in the heart of Port Everglades. This allowed Resolve to address public/industry needs for specialized training facilities as well as provide a base for their own in-house fire and hazmat response teams. Resolve's business model, having been divided into salvage, fire, and marine services, continued to successfully compliment the US salvage market for over 10 years. However, expansion into new markets was the next logical milestone and in 2009, Resolve reorganized to properly expand its subsidiaries into the global arena. Resolve's separate salvage and firefighting divisions were combined to form Resolve Salvage & Fire Inc., providing salvage and firefighting response worldwide. The maritime training division was properly renamed the Resolve Maritime Academy. Resolve Marine Services, Inc. continues to provide marine contracting services and support throughout the Americas.

MERCHANT MARINES

The United States Postal Service will pay tribute to the U S Merchant Marine when it issues a pane of four stamps in July. The pane features types of vessels that have formed an important part of merchant mariner history: clipper ships, auxiliary steamships, Liberty ships, and container ships. Since colonial times, America's merchant ships have plied the oceans and other navigable waters conveying goods and passengers. During wartime, they have also helped deliver troops and war materials. This role was formalized shortly before World War II, when legislation empowered the "U.S. Merchant Marine" to serve as a naval auxiliary unit. During World War II, the U.S. Merchant Marine bore the brunt of delivering military supplies overseas to U.S. forces and allies. Today, it continues to help meet the nation's security needs while also transporting commodities that sustain the American economy.

Clipper Ships, ushered in by the California Gold Rush of 1849 and noted for their streamlined shape and majestic cloud of square-rigged sails, set numerous speed records for their time. Auxiliary Steamships —steam-powered ships with back-up sailing rigs— were the ocean liners of their day, competing in the 1850s with clipper and other sailing ships for transatlantic mail and passenger service. During World War II, the United States built more than 2,700 Liberty ships, plain but sturdy cargo vessels that sustained the Allied forces with a steady supply of food and war material. Container ships, pioneered in the 1950s, are the lifeblood of today's global economy, carrying nearly all the world's manufactured goods across the oceans and exemplifying the modern merchant marine.



NEWS FROM THE SEA SERVICES



On December 1st, Capt. Ekundayo Faux, Deputy Director of the Coast Guard Civil Rights Directorate, presented the Partnership in Education award for outstanding dedication to Capt. Rick Kenin, commanding officer of Coast Guard Air Station Miami. The crew of the Air Station volunteered for guest instructor positions at Florida Memorial University and taught a minimum of four classes per month, investing approximately 25 individual hours per semester to teach, mentor and inspire aviation students.







The Coast Guard will have the first woman superintendent at the helm of the U.S. Coast Guard Academy when classes convene next summer. The commandant of the Coast Guard, Adm. Bob Papp, has selected Rear Adm. Sandra L. Stosz, Coast Guard director of reserve and leadership, for the superintendent position. In her current position, Stosz is responsible for policy affecting the recruitment and training of more than 8,000 Coast Guard reserve members. She has also commanded the Coast Guard's only recruit training center in Cape May, N.J. She will be the first and only female commander to head any of the nation's five military academies. The Coast Guard Academy was established in 1876. The oldest service academy is West Point which was established in 1802.


The deployed guided-missile cruiser USS Leyte Gulf left Lisbon Portugal on January 29, after a four day port visit. During the visit, crew members volunteered some of their liberty time in port to help those less fortunate by participating in various community relations projects (COMRELS) throughout Lisbon. As they do each day on the ship, Sailors used teamwork to accomplish the missions assigned to them at their respective COMREL locations. From assembling bags of food for distribution to local charities to painting and fixing-up bedrooms and play areas for orphaned and at-risk children, the volunteers were able to accomplish in two days what might have taken the staff months to accomplish. On January 31, the Leyte Gulf successfully passed through the Strait of Gibraltar, bringing the ship from the Atlantic to the Mediterranean Sea. With the ship's homeport in Norfolk Virginia now far behind, sailors are busy conducting cooperative missions with allies in the region in support of maritime security operations and theater security cooperation efforts.





The Navy's newest and deadliest destroyer-class warship will be commissioned in Key West. The \$1 billion, 9,200-ton, 509-foot USS Spruance will arrive about Oct. 1, the Navy and City of Key West said. Commander of the ship, Capt. M. Tate Westbrook, said its crew of 285 sailors will prepare the ship for war before it is officially commissioned. It will mark the first combat-ready destroyer warship to be commissioned in Key West waters, said Navy spokesman Jim Brooks. Afterward, the Spruance will set sail for Asia and Mideast waters. The Spruance was christened earlier this year in Bath, Maine, where it was built at Bath Iron Works by Northrop Grumman Ship Systems. The ship is named after Adm. Raymond A. Spruance, the U.S. Navy commander at the Battle of Midway, fought June 4-7, 1942. It will be home-ported in San Diego and is the newest of the Navy's new Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyers that are fitted with the highly touted Aegis Weapon System. The superfast computer radar systems support Tomahawk missiles, which can destroy targets 1.000 miles away. The Spruance's two gas turbine engines produce more than 100,000 horsepower, enough to propel the ship faster than 30 knots, according to the Navy. The ship can work alone or alongside the largest aircraft carriers. The vessel can attack submarines, airplanes, other ships or land targets as indicted by its motto, "Launch the Attack".
