Rear Admiral
United States Coast Guard
Director of Operations
U.S. Southern Command

Rear Admiral Schultz serves as U.S. Southern Command's Director of Operations, J3. As the J3, he directs military operations across the Caribbean Basin and Central and South America. His prior flag officer assignments were as Commander, 11th Coast Guard District where he was responsible for multi-mission Coast Guard operations from the California-Oregon border to Peru, and before that as Director of Governmental and Public Affairs at Coast Guard Headquarters in Washington D.C., where he was responsible for external engagement with Congress, the media, and inter-governmental entities. Previous operational assignments include Sector Command in Miami from 2006-2008, where he oversaw multimission operations in Southeast Florida, as well as sea-going command tours aboard Coast Guard Cutters VENTUROUS (WMEC-625), ACACIA (WLB-406) and FARALLON (WPB-1301). He also served afloat aboard cutters PETREL (WSES-4) and GENTIAN (WLB-290).

Staff assignments include Chief of the Office of Congressional and Governmental Affairs; Congressional Liaison Officer to the U.S. House of Representatives; Liaison Officer to the U.S. Department of State, Bureau for International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs (INL); Assignment Officer at the Coast Guard Personnel Command; and Command Duty Officer in the Seventh Coast Guard District Operations Center in Miami.

RADM Schultz is a 1983 Coast Guard Academy graduate, earning a Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering. In 1992, he was awarded a Masters Degree in Public Administration from the University of Connecticut, and in 2006 completed a one-year National Security Fellowship at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government. His personal awards include the Legion of Merit, the Meritorious Service Medal, the Coast Guard Commendation and Achievement Medals, and the Commandant's Letter of Commendation.

This is the eighth year that Operation Homefront and Dollar Tree joined together to launch its annual Holiday Toy Drive to collect gifts for military kids. Operation Homefront is a national non-profit organization that provides emergency financial and other assistance to military families.

LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS

The following message was sent via email to all Navy League members by Jack Ritter, National Vice President, Legislative Affairs. We felt it was important enough to include it in this month's newsletter for those of you who may have missed it.

I am writing to ask for your support of a new Navy League program. As you know, we recently reached our fundraising goal and were able to purchase a voter-response software, www.cqrcengage.com/navyleague. This software system, also accessible via a link from the main Navy League homepage, allows Navy Leaguers to easily write or call their member of Congress.

As Navy League leaders, you know how important our work is to the sea services. As the budget shrinks and threats from around the world increase, we need strong maritime services. Our voice is needed on Capitol Hill more than ever to tell Congress that the sea services must receive the funding they need.

It is imperative that Navy Leaguers visit and utilize this feature often. One of the primary missions of the Navy League is to inform Congress and the American public on the importance of strong services. The more Congress hears from the Navy League, the more influence we will have as it realizes that Navy Leaguers are politically engaged—they pay attention and make their voices heard. As Navy Leaguers share the website with their friends via social media, the Navy League can also use that pool to identify potential members and grow the Navy League. As leaders in your council, we ask for you to help your council members get excited about this tool. We all joined the Navy League to help the sea services—help them today by writing Congress.

Our current campaigns are extremely important:

•**Stop sequestration:** Tell Congress that the mandated budget cuts of \$500 billion over 1 years hurt the sea services at a time when they are needed most.

•**Fund the Maritime Security Program:** The Maritime Security Program, which funds a public-private partnership necessary for sealift in times of national emergency, was gutted in the Appropriations bill. We can speak out to restore that funding.

•**Food for Peace:** Enforcing needed cargo preference is integral to keeping the U.S.-flag Merchant Marine strong. Recent action has reduced the amount of cargo and we ask that the requirements of this popular program be kept.

•**Help WWII Merchant Marine Veterans:** Ensure WWII Merchant Marine veterans are recognized for their service.

•**Fund Harbor Maintenance:** Ensure the trust is used as it was intended—to keep our ports dredged and maintained to protect commerce and trade.

•**Pass the Coast Guard and Maritime Transportation Reauthorization Act:** This bill reauthorizes major Coast Guard programs, including its recapitalization plan, and strengthens cargo preference. It is in very real danger of not passing the Senate next week—the Coast Guard needs you to write your Senators today.

•**Pass the National Defense Authorization Act:** Ensure the Department of Defense has the authorization for new programs, creates a separate account for funding the Ohio-class replacement, and ensures an 11-carrier Navy.

VITAL FLIGHT



This month, we would like to feature an organization that helps many of our local Veterans - Vital Flight. Tom Powers, one of our Council members has been flying veterans that are blind to a Blind Veterans Program at the VA Hospital in West Palm Beach for

over 24 years. Under the auspices of Vital Flight, Inc. all of these flights are FREE and they also provide the transportation anywhere in Florida to some of the most rural of towns that are supported by an airport.

Vital Flight is Florida's only non-profit, all-Volunteer Pilot Organization. There is no paid staff - just dedicated volunteers - both on the ground and in the air, serving those in need. Below are just some of the situations for which they coordinate air transportation.

Medical - The typical Vital Flight passenger is a patient seeking treatment or therapy for such illness as cancer, vision disorders, cardiovascular disease, or any other illness that requires medical attention on a non-emergency basis.

Compassion - Vital Flight routinely flies wounded or disabled veterans whether injured in the line of duty or otherwise. Vital Flight also offers service to family members who wish to be with their loved ones in time of need whether to be present for medical treatments for family members, funeral services, or to be present for special events.

Humanitarian - Vital Flight participates in airlifts during natural disasters and also transports those in need of relief from areas devastated by these occurrences. Vital Flight also transports victims of crime such as domestic abuse wishing to relocate to new homes.

THANK YOU TO TWO DEVOTED BOARD MEMBERS

The Council's Care Package Program has come to an end. Alan Stein, who along with his wife Shelly, handled this program for many years, has decided to retire from the Council's Board of Directors. Shelly stepped down last year. Al felt this was the right time to also end the Care Package Program. He will continue to participate in Council events.

Al and Shelly Stein joined the Council in 1993 opting to become lifetime members of the Navy League. Both began serving on the Council's Board of Directors shortly after joining the Council. Most people may not remember that the Care Package Program came about after their Book Program which they created in 2004 to populate the libraries on US Navy ships and submarines. For over six years, their program allowed them to provide more than 600 cartons of books to dozens of US Navy and NATO ships and submarines, US Coast Guard Station Fort Lauderdale, US Army and US Navy Hospitals at Walter Reed and Bethesda Medical Center, and 22nd, 24th, and 26th Marine Expeditionary Units (MEUs) at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. When the number of books collected exceeded the number of Service personnel they could provide for, they used the books to raise money for the Council. The Steins requested and received permission from a local Wal-Mart in South Florida to set up a table with a "Support the Troops" banner. Passing shoppers were asked to make a donation and take a book. They raised funds in excess of \$50,000 with some of those funds supporting organizations such as Injured Marine Semper Fi Fund, Marine Corps Scholarship Fund, Intrepid Fallen Heroes Fund, Spruance Division Sea Cadets Program, the Family Support Groups of the Council's adopted ships, Fisher House of Miami and more. Additional funds were also used to purchase tickets to send visiting Sailors to the circus and to Miami Dolphins games; purchase tickets to send 14 Marines to a local birthday ball; purchase 2 SONY Play Station and computer games for USS BATAAN; purchase Xbox 360 games for the USS LEYTE GULF; purchase Welcome Home banners for the Family Support Groups (FSG) of the USS BATAAN and USS LEYTE GULF and for the Family Support Groups of the 24th and 26th MEUs.

Once they decided that there was a need for care packages for our deployed troops, they established and maintained contact, primarily via e-mail, with hundreds of military members to coordinate the reliable delivery of care packages to US service personnel deployed to Iraq and Afghanistan. To date, the Steins have shipped over 1,500 care packages to Sailors and Marines in Iraq and Afghanistan, providing items US servicemen and women requested. The project was expanded to include other volunteer organizations such as Operation Homefront of Florida, the Kiwanis Club of Miramar/Pembroke Pines, and the students of Hollywood Academy of Arts & Sciences. Using social media, email and other means, funds were raised to cover the cost of postage for the packages sent to deployed troops. This allowed other members of the general public to get involved in bolstering the morale of our military. The Steins located and obtained the cooperation of five knitting groups who contributed scarves, helmet liners, and neck gaiters. More than 20 dozen items were shipped to troops serving overseas. Additionally, they contacted Boca Java Coffee Company and arranged for shipment of multiple boxes of gourmet coffee which was delivered to the Council's adopted US Navy ships and service members serving overseas at Joint Intelligence Operations Center Europe (JIOCEUR) Analytic Center (JAC) and US Marine Companies forward deployed in Helmand Province in Afghanistan. In November 2010, Al and Shelly reached out to local Rotary Clubs and, as a result, the Coral Gables Rotary Club made a cash donation and supplied items for inclusion in the boxes.

The Steins certainly deserve recognition for their tireless efforts to ensure the men and women of our military knew that people back home had not forgotten them. There have been numerous thank you emails and letters published in The Helmsman over the years that show just how much these care packages have meant to our deployed troops.

The Council wants to thank Al and Shelly for all they have done for our military over the past 10 years. We know that they may be "retiring" from serving on the Council's Board of Directors but we are confident they will still continue to show their support of the military.

SEA SERVICE NEWS


In June, our Council's adopted ship, the USS Leyte Gulf (CG55) left for a seven-month deployment operating around Europe. They are operating in the

Navy's Sixth Fleet area of responsibility, which includes the Mediterranean Sea. While deployed, the Leyte Gulf and a helicopter anti-submarine squadron is integrating with multinational forces in support of NATO maritime security operations.



Congress has instructed the U.S. Coast Guard to keep its air facility at Newport Oregon open through 2015. The Coast Guard was preparing to

close the facility, where a search-and-rescue helicopter is stationed, on December 15. Coast Guard budget cuts were blamed for the closure. On December 10, the Senate and House of Representatives passed the short-term Coast Guard reauthorization bill which went to President Barack Obama's desk for a signature. The bill does not provide money specifically for the Newport facility, but requires funds to be reallocated within the overall Coast Guard budget.



Navy Lt. Vincent Capodanno, gave his life providing support to his service members. He was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor for his gallantry and heroic conduct while serving with the 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment in Vietnam, September 4, 1967. Capodanno's Medal of

Honor was donated by his family, and dedicated to the Capodanno Chapel at The Basic School at Marine Corps Base Quantico, Virginia on December 9, 2014. The tiny chapel was packed with Marine veterans who served with the 5th Marine Regiment in Vietnam, many chaplains of the United States Navy and active duty Marines. Throughout the ceremony the audience of Marines and Navy chaplains learned how Capodanno was a constant companion to his Marines. He became known as the "Grunt Padre" because he lived, ate and slept in the same conditions as the Marines.



The Navy completed tests on the GhostSwimmer unmanned underwater vehicle (UUV) at Joint Expeditionary Base

Little Creek-Fort Story (JEBLC-FS) on December 11. GhostSwimmer is the latest in a series of science-fiction-turned-reality projects developed by the chief of naval operations' Rapid Innovation Cell (CRIC) project, Silent NEMO. The Ghost Swimmer was developed to resemble the shape and mimic the swimming style of a large fish. At a length of approximately 5 feet and a weight of nearly 100 pounds, the GhostSwimmer vehicle can operate in water depths ranging from 10 inches to 300 feet. Its bio-mimicry provides additional security during low visibility intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (ISR) missions and friendly hull inspections, while quieter than propeller driven craft of the same size, according to Navy Warfare Development Command.

IN MEMORIAM

Captain Jean Fitzgerald, first chair of Broward Navy Days, recently passed away. The following is an excerpt from the obituary that appeared in The Miami Herald:

Jean Fitzgerald, a prominent member of the civic, cultural and political life of Broward County for more than three decades, died of heart failure December 6 in Jacksonville. He was 88. A retired U.S. Navy captain, Fitzgerald had a decorated 31 year career that placed him in charge of three destroyer divisions. He later held a variety of positions at the Pentagon. After retiring in 1974, he moved to Fort Lauderdale and quickly became involved in community work while he nurtured his love of the Navy.

Fitzgerald was one of the six founders of the Port Everglades Association, a group formed in 1979 to advance the interests of port businesses in Fort Lauderdale and to diversify the port. At the time, he was president of Tracor Marine, which ran a full-service shipyard and fleet of oceanographic vessels. From 1984 to 1988, Fitzgerald was a member of the seven-member Port Everglades Authority, serving as an appointee of the Broward County Commission to represent port business interests. Before and after serving on the port authority, Fitzgerald was an executive of Hvide Shipping Inc., a major port tenant. Fitzgerald also co-founded the Florida Alliance, a group of maritime interests that successfully fought the construction of an oil pipeline to Port Everglades.

In 1990, he founded Broward Navy Days, an annual event that promotes the presence of the Navy and Coast Guard in Fort Lauderdale. He was a member of the Broward Civic Center, the forerunner of the group that led to creation of the city's performing arts center, and served for many years on the Broward Arts Council, Gold Coast Jazz Society and Broward Public Library Foundation.

Fitzgerald and his wife, Carol, moved to Jacksonville in 2012 to be closer to family members. Services were held on December 11 in Jacksonville. In lieu of flowers, the family asked that donations be made to Seafarers House, 2550 Eisenhower Blvd., Fort Lauderdale, or Light of the World Clinic, 806 Prospect Rd., Oakland Park, FL.


