#### USS BATAAN—NEWS



On April 30, our adopted ship, the USS Bataan's Heritage Committee sponsored a Days of Remembrance to close the ship's Holocaust Remembrance week. The committee built a

Star of David wreath and set up a memorial, including historical information, to bring awareness and honor all those who suffered during the Holocaust. The Sailors and Marines paid tribute by dropping off handmade flowers and cards throughout the week. The commemoration closed with a ceremony and military procession, where the wreath was taken from the mess decks and laid to rest in the ocean. Senior Chief Aviation Boatswain's Mate (Fuel) Hawa P. Riley served as the heritage committee coordinator and believes it is important to remember this time in history. The Commanding Officer of Bataan, Capt. Eric Pfister, also shared some thoughts during the ceremony. He invited the crew to look back and remember that fear and indifference can lead to hatred and creates and opportunity for evil to thrive. In 1980, Congress established the United States annual commemoration of the Holocaust known as the Days of Remembrance, which runs from April 23-30, to include Holocaust Remembrance Day (Yom Hashoah) on April 24. Bataan and its ready group are currently deployed in the U.S. 5th Fleet area of operations in support of maritime security operations designed to reassure allies and partners, and preserve the freedom of navigation and the free flow of commerce in the region.

## RECOGNIZING OUR YOUTH

### SEA SERVICE NEWS



On May 18, the crew of the USCGC Hamilton offloaded approximately 18.5 tons of cocaine (shown in photo) in Port Everglades worth an esti-

mated \$498 million wholesale. The drugs were interdicted in international waters along Central and South America by several Coast Guard cutters and a Royal Canadian Navy ship sailing with an embarked Coast Guard Law Enforcement Detachment (LEDET) team aboard. The offload represents 20 separate, suspected drug smuggling vessel interdictions. The Coast Guard increased U.S. and allied presence in the Eastern Pacific Ocean and Caribbean Basin, which are known drug transit zones off of Central and South America, as part of its Western Hemisphere Strategy. The law enforcement phase of counter-smuggling operations in the Eastern Pacific are conducted under the authority of the 11th Coast Guard District headquartered in Alameda, California.



On May 8, the Navy's newest littoral combat ship, the future USS Gabrielle Giffords (LCS 10), departed from Mobile, Alabama, beginning her journey to her commissioning site in Galveston, Texas. The ship's commis-

sioning is scheduled for June 10, after which she will begin her transit to her eventual homeport of San Diego. Gabrielle Giffords is the ninth littoral combat ship delivered to the Navy and the fifth LCS of the Independence variant. The Independence variant is noted for its unique hull, ability to operate at high speeds, and large flight deck size. LCS is a high-speed, agile, shallow draft, focused-mission surface combatant designed for operations in the littoral environment, yet fully capable of open ocean operations. LCS is complementary to the surface fleet, with the ability to counter and outpace evolving threats independently or within a network of surface combatants.



On May 3, our adopted ship, the USS Leyte Gulf arrived in Tromso, Norway, for a scheduled port visit to enhance U.S.-Norway relations as the two nations work together for a stable, secure and prosperous European region. The ship's presence in the Norwegian Sea is a demonstration of our continued commitment to the collective security of the

European region. Leyte Gulf departed its homeport of

Norfolk on March 27 on a scheduled deployment to conduct maritime security operations in support of U.S. allies and partners and U.S. national security interests in Europe. Strengthening partnerships during the port visit to Tromso demonstrates enduring relationships and our shared commitment to promoting safety and stability within the region, while seeking opportunities to enhance our interoperability as NATO allies.



Marine Corps
Systems Command is bringing innovative, life-saving and awardwinning technology to Marines on the front line.
The In-

frascanner is a portable, medical diagnostic device that provides early detection of intracranial hematomas—or bleeding within the skull—in the field, potentially saving lives and improving casualty care and recovery. The handheld device uses near-infrared light—invisible light that is nearly visible to the naked eye—to effectively check for intracranial hematomas on different parts of the skull. With the device, medical personnel at battalion aid stations can quickly assess Marines who may have suffered a head injury. Prior to the fielding of the Infrascanner in 2015, medical personnel relied primarily on the Military Acute Concussion Evaluation, a questionnaire and screening tool gauging the severity of symptoms and potential cognitive deficits associated with concussions.



National Maritime Day was observed across the United States on May 22, the date that the American steamship Savannah set sail from Savannah, Georgia. It

was the first transoceanic voyage fueled by steam. National Maritime Day was created by the United States Congress on May 20, 1933 to recognize the maritime industry, National Maritime Day also honors America's Merchant Marines for their contributions and sacrifices for our country. Special acknowledgment is given to ships and seafarers that have held a prominent place in our nation's history. Locally, Port Everglades hosted its 7th Annual Keep Port Everglades Shipshape painting party on May 20 to honor and recognize the maritime industry and its benefits. Keep Port Everglades Shipshape is a port-wide campaign held to encourage recycling and cleanliness at the world's third busiest cruise port and Florida's top containerized cargo port.
