# PAST PRESIDENT

Congratulations to the Council's Past President Glenn Wiltshire!

The Broward County Commission has named Deputy Director Glenn Wiltshire as acting Port Everglades CEO and director, replacing Steve Cernak, who died earlier this month. The commission named Wiltshire on March 28. "They needed to get somebody in place for continuity," he said Friday in a telephone interview, adding that he will concentrate on a 20-year master plan that includes \$1.6 billion in capital improvements at the port. He said the commission did not discuss a search for a permanent director.

The port conducted a memorial service Friday for Cernak, which was attended by 200 people, including top executives from the Royal Caribbean and Celebrity cruise lines. Cernak, who took the helm of the port in 2012, was leading it through a number of improvement projects when he died of pancreatic cancer March 16. He was the immediate past chairman of the American Association of Port Authorities.

Wiltshire is a graduate of the U.S. Coast Guard Academy and served for 30 years. He also holds a Master of Public Administration from Harvard University. Wiltshire had been was deputy director of Port Everglades since 2006, overseeing administration and operations, maintenance, and management of countyowned "landlord port" facilities with multiple tenants. He directly supervised four division directors and seaport security functions and oversaw a port staff of 251 people. He was also the port's primary liaison to elected officials, federal, state and local government agencies, environmental groups and port users. He worked closely with the U.S. Customs and Border Protection Director of Field Operations, addressing changes in operations to account for increasing cruise and cargo activity. From 2004 to 2006, he was captain of the Port New York/New Jersey Coast Guard facility at Staten Island, N.Y., the largest Coast Guard field operational command in the country with over 1,000 military and civilian personnel and 2,000 volunteers.

As Port Everglades director, Wiltshire inherits a massive dredging project designed to allow larger container ships into the port, as well as the extension of the south port turning notch and other major capital projects. The port generated nearly \$168 million in revenues in fiscal year 2018. It is one of the nation's leading container ports and a world leader in the cruise industry, with space for up to eight cruise liners on any given day. (story from SunSentinel.com)

## **USS TAMPA**

The Coast Guard is asking the public for information regarding crew members of the WWI ship USS Tampa, which sank after being shot by a German torpedo. The Coast Guard wants to posthumously award Purple Heart medals to the entire crew; however, 84 medals have yet to be claimed. Spread the word and help the descendants of these war heroes. Below is an excerpt of an article appearing in Tampa Bay Times in September 2018 which gives some of the history of the USS Tampa.

As dusk was settling in over the Irish sea, a German submarine spotted a lone ship steaming toward England's Bristol Channel. The U-boat dived to attack. About half an hour later, it fired a single torpedo. The USS Tampa sank so quickly on Sept. 26, 1918, that none of the 131 people aboard had time to signal for help. When boats and a plane went to search for it, there were few signs the ship had ever existed — only a field of debris spread across eight square miles, and later, a boat nameplate and four unidentifiable bodies.

The sinking represented the largest loss of life for the U.S. Coast Guard during the four years and four months of World War I, according to naval historian Michael Lowrey, who is writing a book about U-Boats. The Tampa, skippered by Capt. Charles Satterlee, had been transferred from the Coast Guard to the Navy after the United States entered the war — switching missions from protecting people against icebergs to protecting wartime convoys. References to the ship are interwoven into Coast Guard life today — in Semper Paratus, the service's anthem, in the name of an active duty cutter, and on a building named for the Tampa's captain at the Coast Guard Academy.

# NAS RICHMOND HEIGHTS SEA CADETS



The Council presently provides support to a Naval Sea Cadet unit in Miami-Dade County. Until recently, the name of the unit was the Zeus Division; however, the name has now been

changed to the NAS Richmond Heights Division of the Sea Cadets. Many may not know the history behind NAS Richmond Heights, located about 18 miles south of Miami and 3.5 miles west of US 1. The following information and photo were taken from the website Airfields-Freeman.com in a section on abandoned and little known airfields.

The Navy purchased 2,107 acres at this location in 1941 to construct a blimp base to provide protection for Florida area shipping from German submarines. NAS Richmond was commissioned in 1942 and was, at the time, one of the largest construction projects to ever have been undertaken in Dade County. In 1943, one of Richmond's blimps detected a sub via radar. It made a depth charge run on the sub, but was hit by anti-aircraft gunfire and crashed into the sea. This was the only blimp lost to enemy action in US waters during the war.

At its wartime peak, Richmond was home to 25 Kseries blimps, a 2,000' diameter landing mat, eight circular concrete mooring pads, 2 runways, 3 huge blimp hangars, a helium plant, and 3,000 men. The station eventually became the largest blimp base on the east coast. Richmond's 3 blimp hangars were massive: 1,086' long & 183' high, with an interior floor space of 7 acres apiece. From November 1943 to May 1945, Richmond's blimps logged 730 continuous days on patrol. This was a record untouched by any other Navy airship squadron. As a result of these unrelenting patrols, the number of successful enemy torpedo attacks in the South Florida area were reduced from 1942's total of 114 to only 4 sinkings in 1943.

NAS Richmond survived the Second World War without a scratch, only to be dealt a fatal blow not long thereafter by Mother Nature. On 9/15/45, 3 years to the date of the base's commissioning, Richmond was devastated by a direct hit from a hurricane, with 123 mph winds striking the massive blimp hangars. The hangars, which stood close together, withstood the winds but one of them caught fire. Eventually all 3 hangars were ablaze. It was the largest fire in the United States in 1945. When the rain stopped, all 3 of the massive hangars were completely gone, with only the smaller buildings & the hangars' concrete corner pillars still standing. With the war over, the massive hangars would not be rebuilt. Blimps never returned permanently to Richmond after the storm, but the base's helium plant continued to supply Navy airships for years. Richmond's other buildings served a variety of uses, such as providing space for Naval & Marine Corps Reserve units.

In 1946, 1,571 acres of the Richmond base were deeded to the University of Miami, to be known as "South Campus".

According to Thomas Page, in 1962 the Richmond Air Force Station (Z-210), a radar facility, was constructed to the northwest of the former blimp airfield, consisting of 3 radar towers. The facility remained in operation by the FAA until destroyed by Hurricane Andrew in 1992.

Starting in 1962 the former NAS Richmond was reused in a curious role. The CIA leased a few buildings from the University of Miami under the "front" name of Zenith Technological Services. This "front" company was in fact the intelligence gathering headquarters for efforts against the Cuban communist government, known as JM/WAVE, aka JM WAVE, aka WAVE STATION. Over 400 CIA operatives operated out of this facility. In 1968 the CIA facility moved from Richmond to North Dade County.

This year's event will take place from May 6 - 8 at the Gaylord National Convention Center in National Harbor, Maryland. The Sea-Air-Space Exposition is free and open to the following qualified attendees: Active duty, reserve and retired U.S. Military, U.S. federal, state and local government employees, Members of Congress and Congressional Staff, Representatives of foreign embassies, government and military, Representatives of exhibiting companies and non-exhibiting defense industry companies, Navy League members. #### SEA SERVICE NEWS



The Navy's newest Arleigh Burke-class guided-missile destroyer has been named in honor of Korean War veteran

and Navy Cross recipient Aviation Machinist's Mate 3rd Class George Neal. In a release, Secretary of the Navy Richard V. Spencer said Neal distinguished himself by volunteering to go into North Korea to rescue a downed American pilot. The future USS George M. Neal (DDG 131) will be a Flight III destroyer capable of fighting air, surface and subsurface battles simultaneously. It will be outfitted with a combination of offensive and defensive weapon systems that are designed to support maritime warfare, including integrated air and missile defense and vertical launch capabilities. The ship will be constructed at Huntington Ingalls in Pascagoula, Mississippi. It will be 509 feet long, have a beam length of 59 feet and be capable of operating at speeds in excess of 30 knots. A new Marine rotation is expected in Norway in the coming weeks as the Corps continues to prep its forces for a potential coldweather fight. Roughly 700 Ma-

rines from 1st Battalion, 8th Marine Regiment, will be the primary unit deploying for the next Marine Rotational Force-Europe rotation through Norway. This will be the Corps' fifth six-month rotation to Norway. During the previous rotation, Marines focused on learning how to survive and fight in extreme cold-weather environments. The rotation also worked with partner forces on Arctic and mountain warfare. That will still be a focus for 1st Battalion during the opening salvo of their deployment. The expanded U.S. footprint was agreed to by the Norwegian government over the summer, during a time of renewed tensions with Russia. In addition to the training opportunities, analysts argue that the Corps' heel-to-toe footprint in Norway acts as a deterrence force against a possible Russian incursion. U.S. forces have also been storing gear in a series of caves in Norway to equip a Marine Air-Ground Task Force if a war were to break out in the Europe. #### **COAST GUARD NEWS**

There was some good news for the Coast Guard in the spending bill signed into law in February. It included seven regular appropriations bills for fiscal year 2019 including the Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act 2019. The Act provided \$655 million for production of the first Polar Security Cutter (PSC) heavy icebreaker and \$20 million for long lead time materials for a second PSC. It also funds increases of \$5 million for post-delivery activities for the tenth National Security Cutter; \$2.6 million for post-delivery activities for a second PSC to support the acquisition of a Great Lakes icebreaker and \$100 million for additional Fat Response Cutters.
