



#### President's Report

Our secretary, Shelley Beck and I attended the National Convention of the Navy League in Orlando this month. We each attended different classes. For me it felt like "standing in front of a fire hydrant" with all the information presented. However, some of it I absorbed but overall I became more aware of the magnitude of needs our sea services need and the support of our Congress.

As a "maritime nation" we are bordered by two oceans. It is imperative for America's prosperity that the shipping routes remain open and safe. We depend on our sea services to ensure this.

Related to international shipping is the size of our flagged fleet. Each year the number of US flagged ships decreases. In 1990 there were 408 US flagged ships and that number has descended to 183 in 2020. Another "take away" from the convention is an acronym that can be used when explaining what the Navy League does. S.E.A.-Support, Educate, and Advocate. This is easy to remember and gives a brief outline to discuss the mission of the Navy League.

#### **New Coast Guard Commandant**

Adm. Linda Fagan pledged her "highest priority as commandant will be to transform our policy management system" in remarks following her swearing in as the 27th leader of the Coast Guard and the first woman to lead a branch of the armed services.

Speaking Wednesday at the change-of-command ceremony in Washington, D.C., she said, referring to the men and women serving in uniform in the Coast Guard and the service's civilian employees, "without you, steel doesn't move."

Fagan, who served as vice commandant since June 2021, said during her tenure as commandant she intended to give them "policy, training [and] support to succeed" as the Coast Guard modernizes its cutters, boats, aircraft and shore facilities.

Having graduated as one of 16 women from the Coast Guard Academy in 1985, Fagan added, "There has never been a more exciting time to be in the Coast Guard. ...The pace of change creates challenges."

Speaking of her command ahead, Fagan noted "the demand for Coast Guard missions has never been higher. ...

Today we will advance the Coast Guard America needs for tomorrow. Tomorrow looks different and so will we. We will be more adaptive and connected, generate sustained readiness, resilience and capabilities in new ways to enhance our nation's maritime safety, security and prosperity."

#### **New Master Chief PO**

Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Mike Gilday has selected Fleet Master Chief James Honea to become the 16th master chief petty officer of the Navy. Honea, who currently serves as the senior enlisted leader of U.S. Indo-Pacific Command, will take on the new job Sept. 8.

"I selected Fleet Master Chief Honea because he has saltwater in his veins, embodies Navy values in every fiber of his being, and is the right leader to inspire and motivate our Chiefs Mess to continue to be the best in the world," Gilday said. "I know he and I will work together to take care of our Sailors and ensure our Navy is the most formidable across the globe."

Honea enlisted in 1987 and advanced through the ranks as a boatswain's mate.

## **USS** Ft Lauderdale



FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. – The future USS Fort Lauderdale (LPD 28), a San Antonio-class amphibious transport dock ship, will be commissioned, Saturday, July 30 in Fort Lauderdale, Florida.

Capt. James Quaresimo, a 1997 Summa Cum Laude graduate of Jacksonville University, is the commanding officer.

"The commissioning of USS Fort Lauderdale is the result of many years of coordination and hard work by our lawmakers, commissioning committee, civic leaders, contractors, industry specialists, and especially our Sailors," Quaresimo said. "I couldn't be prouder of the uniformed men and women who gave a mountain of cold steel form and a heartbeat. And in turn they should be proud of what they've done."

The ship was built by Ingalls Shipbuilding, a shipyard located in Pascagoula, Mississippi.

The ship's naming was in large part the brainchild of the late retired Senior Chief Petty Officer Charles "Chuck" Black, who led a years-long effort to get the U.S. Navy to name a ship USS Fort Lauderdale. Black, who died at 63 years of age in 2016, served 20 years in the Navy and was involved in several of the annual Broward Navy Day Fleet Week activities at Port Everglades. He served on the Navy League's national board of directors as well. The Navy announced in March 2016 it would name an amphibious transportation dock vessel for the city that Black gained a great appreciation for after moving to Fort Lauderdale in 2003.

As an amphibious transport dock ship, USS Fort Lauderdale, whose motto is "Together We Fight" is a warship designed to embark, transport and land elements of a landing force for a variety of expeditionary warfare missions.

LPDs are used to transport and land Marines, their equipment, and supplies by embarked Landing Craft Air Cushion (LCAC) or conventional landing craft and amphibious assault vehicles (AAV) augmented by helicopters or vertical take-off and landing aircraft (MV 22). These ships support amphibious assault, special operations, or expeditionary warfare missions and serve as secondary aviation platforms for amphibious operations.

## Advocating on Behalf of the Sea Services

Advocacy is a main pillar of the Navy League's mission. As a nonprofit organization, we are able to mobilize our grassroots membership to get to the heart of the issues that matter to the sea services, both on Capitol Hill and in our local communities.

## **Energizing American Shipbuilding Act**

The U.S.-owned commercial ocean carrier industry is relied upon to provide sealift in peace, crisis, and war. In addition, they provide our warfighters and humanitarian workers with the logistics ability to accomplish their mission by deploying military assets. Unfortunately, the American ocean-going fleet has dropped to only 85 U.S.-flag ships in foreign trade. Further, the Maritime Administration has testified that there are insufficient ocean-going ships in the domestic and foreign trades to fully crew all U.S.-flag commercial and government reserve sealift vessels for a sustained period of more than six months due to a shortage of approximately 1,800 mariners. The Energizing American Shipbuilding Act would overcome many of these current deficits and with China poised to become a major purchaser of American LNG, implementing the provisions of the bill has never been more urgent.

#### **Fund Tanker Security Program**

While our Armed Forces were able to primarily utilize foreign flagged tankers in the past, the strategic environment has fundamentally changed. China might not have intervened in the past with countries whose tankers supplied fuel to our forces because of capability limitations and lack of strategic interest, but they will likely hinder foreign flagged tankers from participating in operations contrary to their strategic interests, particularly in the Pacific. The bottom line is that maintaining the logistical ability to fuel a sustained force presence is a deterrent to action by our adversaries, and necessary in case of open conflict. For this reason, Congress and the White House must work together to establish and fund a fleet of Tanker Security Program ships capable of meeting the needs of American naval and ground-based forces conducting major operations in the Indo-Pacific.

#### **Support the Jones Act**

The Jones Act requires that vessels moving cargo between U.S. ports be American built, American owned and American crewed—is fundamental to our domestic maritime industry. You no doubt know that there was significant turnover in Congress in the last election and many new members need to learn about the Jones Act, its importance to America and it relevance to their constituents. This becomes even more critical when one considers that there are well-funded groups working hard today, advocating for repeal of the Jones Act.

The Jones Act helps support nearly 650,000 jobs across America, with an annual economic impact of more than \$150 billion. More importantly to the nation as a whole, the law provides important national, homeland, and economic security benefits. We all should be proud of the contributions we make to our nation under the Jones Act.

Additionally, the Jones Act plays a critical role in maintaining our Merchant Mariner force and sealift capacity. Both are foundational aspects of wartime transport and emergency resupply. When our nation went to war in Iraq and Afghanistan, Mariners from the U.S.-flag Jones Act and International trading fleets crewed the Reserve Fleet ships that answered the call to transport military equipment across the oceans to support our war effort. When natural disasters devastated Puerto Rico and neighboring countries like Haiti, it was the Jones Act vessels that delivered vital emergency supplies. Only the U.S. Flag Merchant Marine and its Allies can be relied upon in our time of need, and the Jones Act ensures that those forces remain strong and ready for whatever dangers await our nation in the future.

# USS Paul Ignatius completes homeport shift following inaugural patrol to 6th Fleet



The guided-missile destroyer Paul Ignatius is now based in Rota, Spain, after completing a homeport shift from Mayport, Florida.

The ship departed Mayport on April 27 for an inaugural patrol to the U.S. 6th Fleet area of operations to team up with fellow destroyers Arleigh Burke, Ross, Porter and Roosevelt as one of the Forward Deployed Naval Force-Europe ships based in Rota.

During the patrol, the ship participated in exercises Cable Car and Green Light with British, Canadian, French, German and Norwegian allies. The ship also conducted interoperability exercises with the littoral combat ship Sioux City, which deployed to the 5th and 6th Fleet for the first time this spring.

It arrived in Rota June 17, and many of the sailors' families were on hand to greet them after relocating to the new home port.

"The ship's arrival to Rota is one of several scheduled homeport shifts to occur in support of the U.S. Navy's long-range plan to gradually rotate the Rota-based destroyers," the Navy said in a statement. "The arrival also coincides with the arrival of Helicopter Maritime Strike Squadron (HSM) 79, which will provide rotarywing mission capabilities to the FDNF-E destroyers."

The destroyer will back NATO's Integrated Air Missile Defense architecture under Commander, Task Force 65 and Destroyer Squadron 60. The FDNF-E ships have the flexibility to operate throughout the waters of Europe and Africa, from the Cape of Good Hope to the Arctic Circle, according to the release.

In January, the commanding officer of the destroyer was relieved "due to a failure to follow proper ship-board procedures," the Navy said. The decision was made following a command investigation.

The ship was commissioned in 2019, and is named after former secretary of the Navy, Paul Ignatius, who served during the Lyndon B. Johnson administration.

The destroyer arrived in Rota June 17.

MIAMI — Capt. Christopher Cederholm relieved Capt. Jo-Ann Burdian as the commander of Coast Guard Sector Miami, Friday, during a change-of-command ceremony at Coast Guard Base Miami Beach.

Cederholm reported to Sector Miami from Coast Guard Sector Puget Sound where he was the deputy sector commander since 2019. Burdian, the first Latina sector commander, will transfer to Coast Guard Headquarters as the assistant commandant for response policy.

Rear Adm. Brendan C. McPherson, the Coast Guard Seventh District Commander, presided over the event.

Sector Miami is comprised of more than 900 activeduty, reserve and civilian personnel, and more than 1,300 auxiliarists. The sector has four small boat stations, six Fast Response Cutters, three Coastal Patrol Boats, one Construction Tender, two aids to navigation teams and one Marine Safety Detachment.

In the past year, Sector Miami conducted, as part of the Coast Guard Seventh District, numerous search and rescue cases saving and assisting more than 1,400 lives. In the fourth largest port in the country, Sector Miami teams conducted approximately 9,000 vessel and facility inspections.


