New Top Enlisted Sailor

The Navy has a new top enlisted sailor after Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy James Honea took over for now-retired Master Chief Russell Smith on September 8th in a MPCON Change of Office Ceremony held at the US Naval Academy.

According to the service record provided by the Navy, Honea enlisted in 1987 and has served on five ships, including the now destroyed USS Bonhomme Richard.

He also had postings from Newport, Rhode Island, and Norfolk, Virginia, to San Diego, California, and Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

Before becoming the master chief petty officer of the Navy, Honea served as the senior enlisted leader for U.S. Indo-Pacific Command.

USS Enterprise

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. — With its predecessor sitting just miles away in another part of the shipyard, Newport News Shipbuilding today ceremonially laid the keel for the future USS Enterprise (CVN-80), the third aircraft carrier in the Ford-class program.

The new carrier, sponsored by Olympic athletes Simone Biles and Katie Ledecky, will be the ninth in the US Navy's history to bear the name "Enterprise" (and not including the iconic starship from "Star Trek").

LOCKPORT, La. — Bollinger Shipyards LLC has delivered the Coast Guard Cutter William Chadwick to the U.S. Coast Guard in Key West, Florida, the company said Aug. 4. This is the 176th vessel Bollinger has delivered to the U.S. Coast Guard over a 35-year period and the 50th fast response cutter delivered under the current program.

"It's incredibly meaningful that we could deliver the 50th FRC, the USCGC William Chadwick, on the Coast Guard's 232nd birthday and that she'll be homeported in Sector Boston, the birthplace of the Coast Guard," said Bollinger President and CEO Ben Bordelon.

NAVAL AIR STATION FORT LAUDERDALE MUSEUM

Recently council director Charles Schmidt and wife Diane visited the Naval Air Station Fort Lauderdale Museum. Here he recounts their visit.



This local historical treasure is dedicated to preserve the records and memories of the Naval Air Station Fort Lauderdale. The museum is the only remaining building of more than 200 that existed during WWII. The NASFL was a base to train pilots and air crews on the Avenger torpedo bomber from 1942-46.

The Station has the complete records of "The Lost Squadron". On 5 December 1945 Flight 19 took off on a torpedo bombing mission in the Bahamas. LCR Taylor reported they were lost 90 minutes after takeoff. Despite days of searching no trace of the 5 Avengers and their 14 crewmen were ever found. Adding to the tragedy a Mariner rescue plane also vanished with a crew of 13 men aboard.



But, the museum is much more than just the history of Flight 19. Museum historian, George Counts, gave my wife and me a 90 minute guided tour of all the additional artifacts, records and photos. In particular, we

visited the Bush room. George W. Bush entered training at NASFL in 1943 and became the youngest Avenger Bomber pilot at age 19! The room contains artifacts and photos of George Bush including his foot locker. President Bush returned in 1992 and autographed a beautiful painting of an Avenger.





In the museum there is a Link simulator used to train the pilots. Among other artifacts are numbers of uniforms, equipment, photos and models of the era. Navy veteran Don Fallon has built and donated over 400 models to the museum. In summary, this museum is a fascinating experience. You will be rewarded if you visit.


Honor Flight

My emotions were more than I can explain. If there were 500 people cheering us home the number was probably close to 1000.

General Smith is currently serving as the 36th Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps.

Born in Kansas City, Missouri, and raised in Plano, Texas, General Smith graduated from Texas A&M University and was commissioned in 1987. He has commanded at every level, including Weapons Company, 2nd Battalion, 2nd Marine Regiment during Operation Assured Response in Monrovia, Liberia; 1st Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment during Operation Iraqi Freedom; and 8th Marine Regiment/ Regimental Combat Team 8 during Operation Enduring Freedom. He also served in Caracas, Venezuela as part of the U.S. Military Group.

As a General Officer, he commanded U.S. Marine Corps Forces Southern Command, 1st Marine Division, III Marine Expeditionary Force, and Marine Corps Combat Development Command.

General Smith's staff assignments as a General Officer include serving as the Director of Capability Development Directorate, Combat Development and Integration; Senior Military Assistant to both the Deputy Secretary of Defense and Secretary of Defense; and Deputy Commandant for Combat Development and Integration.

On September 7th Glenn Wiltshire traveled to Coast Guard Air Station Miami to present an enlisted Person of the Quarter (EPOQ) to AET3 Connor Denmark. The award was presented to him for his performance of duty including servicing and upgrading night vision goggles used for night flying and for his participation in a summer deployment as part of an air crew in the Great Lakes.

He also separately received a safety award for discovering maintenance issues on the deployed aircraft.

In an article posted by the Miami Herald a few days after Hurricane Ian ravaged the southwest coast of Florida, they reported that almost 650 people have been rescued by Coast Guard units, according to data provided by Air Station Miami. There have been more than 150 flight missions, which have rescued 261 people and 75 pets.

They further reported that the Coast Guard's flood water rescue teams have located an additional 380 people and 19 pets and also transported seven loads of supplies and 60 first responders to areas in need.

In case you were wondering...

Of all our local Coast Guard units it appears that the only one significantly affected by Hurricane lan has been Air Station Miami. They have been flying many missions rescuing people and pets from Sanibel Island.

Did you Know?

United States Coast Guard

The US Coast Guard celebrated its 232nd birthday on Aug. 4th. Here are a few fun facts about our nation's oldest military service you may not have been aware of.

The US Coast Guard is older than the Navy

The Coast Guard began life when President Washington established the Revenue Cutter Service to enforce U.S. tariffs in 1790, and was America's only maritime defense force until the Department of the Navy was established in 1798

The Coast Guard Is Also a Blue-Water Naval Force

The USCG's advanced National Security Cutters are advanced ships capable of operating in the open ocean. Although its missions are different from the Navy's, the newest cutters carry many of the same weapons systems that are present on naval vessels.

Coast Guard Officers Train Aboard a Captured Nazi Sailing Ship

The USCGC Eagle began its life in 1936 in Nazi Germany as the SSS Horst Wessel. The Horst Wessel was intended to serve as a training ship for the German Kriegsmarine. It served the Germans for three years, but when World War II kicked off, it was sidelined. With the defeat of Nazi Germany in 1945, the vessel was captured by the British. It eventually fell into American hands and was sailed across the Atlantic Ocean by a team of American and German seamen. Today it's the flagship of the Coast Guard and trains USCG cadets and officers in practical seamanship skills.



The Coast Guard Has Its Own Special Operators

Akin to the Army's Green Berets, and U.S. Navy SEALs, the Coast Guard has Maritime Safety and Security Teams (MSST) and Maritime Security Response Teams (MSRT). Coast Guard MSST are used to prevent or deter potential terrorist attacks on the seas, while Coast Guard MSRT are trained to board and secure vessels, including those held by terrorists holding hostages.

The Coast Guard has a Medal of Honor Recipient

Signalman First Class Douglas Munro volunteered to support the Navy in landing Marines during the 1942 landings at Guadalcanal.

To protect Marines loading onto evacuation boats, Munro placed his boat between them and incoming fire to protect the Marines. While doing this Munro was killed by a Japanese machine gun.
